To qualify, students must be members of a philately club or hold a Philately Deposit Account (PDA) in a post office. This aspect of the Yojana encourages schools to form philately clubs if they do not already have one, fostering a community of young collectors. Alternatively, students can open a PDA with a minimum deposit of ₹200, ensuring that even those without access to school clubs can participate.

The selection process consists of two stages. In the first stage, a written quiz on philately, consisting of 50 multiple-choice questions, is conducted at the divisional level. Successful candidates from this quiz move on to the second stage, where they must submit a philately-related project. A committee of postal officers and eminent philatelists evaluates these projects, ensuring that selections are made based on both knowledge and research capabilities.

Educational Impact of Philately



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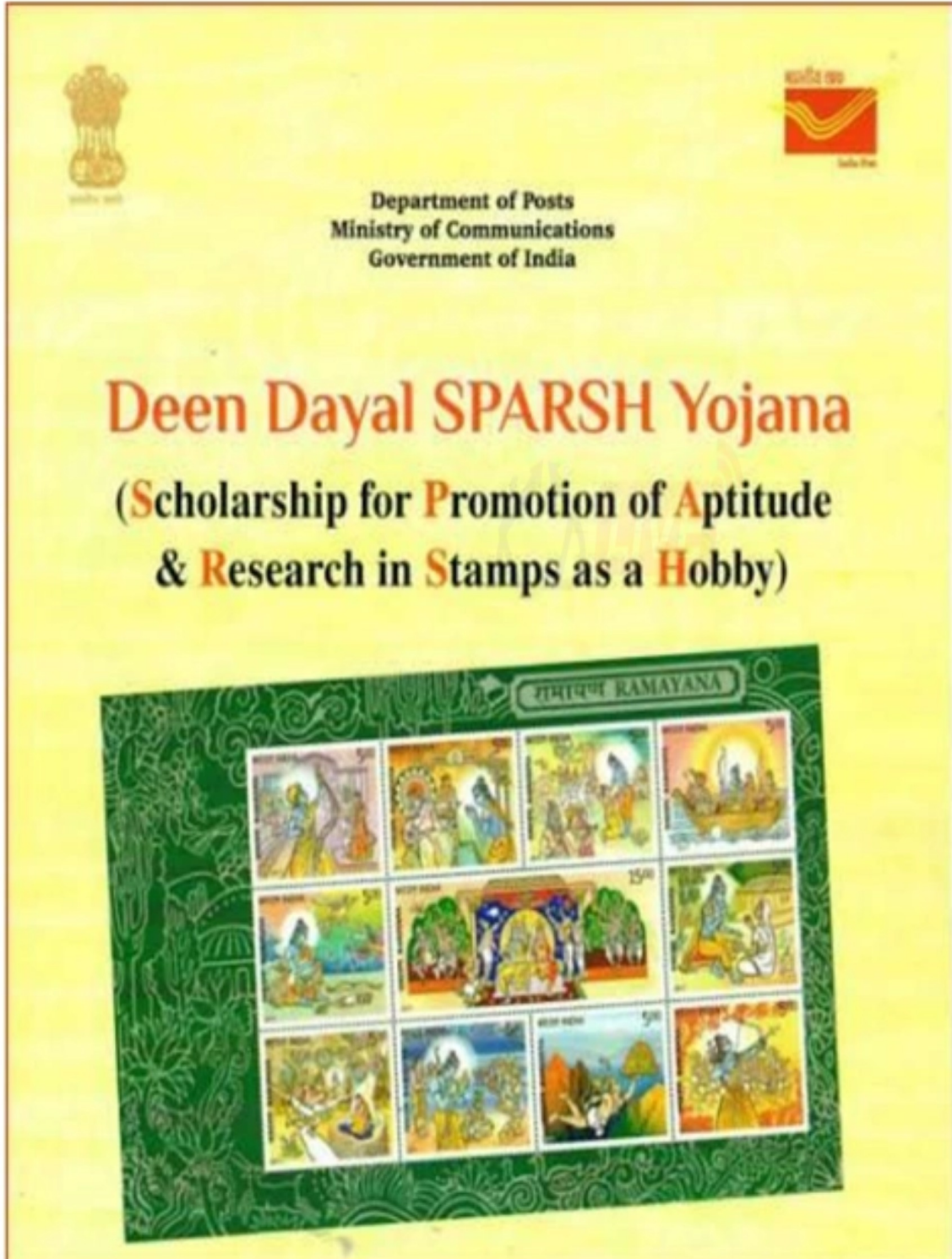
