Attempts to unify the rival parliaments have consistently faltered, despite international pressure, including plans for elections in 2021 that never materialized. The recent history of Libya is marked by conflicts between the two sides, with Hiftar's forces even launching a year-long, failed military campaign to capture the capital, Tripoli, in 2020.

# **Migrant Crisis and Resource Allocation**



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
