a. Japan: Gold Medal (Score: 58.40)


b. India: Silver Medal (Score: 24.13)

c. Chinese Taipei: Bronze Medal (Score: 23.93)

d. China: Fourth Place (Score: 22.10)

Although Japan's comprehensive victory placed them well ahead of the rest, India's silver medal marks the first time the country has reached the podium in such a significant event. 
