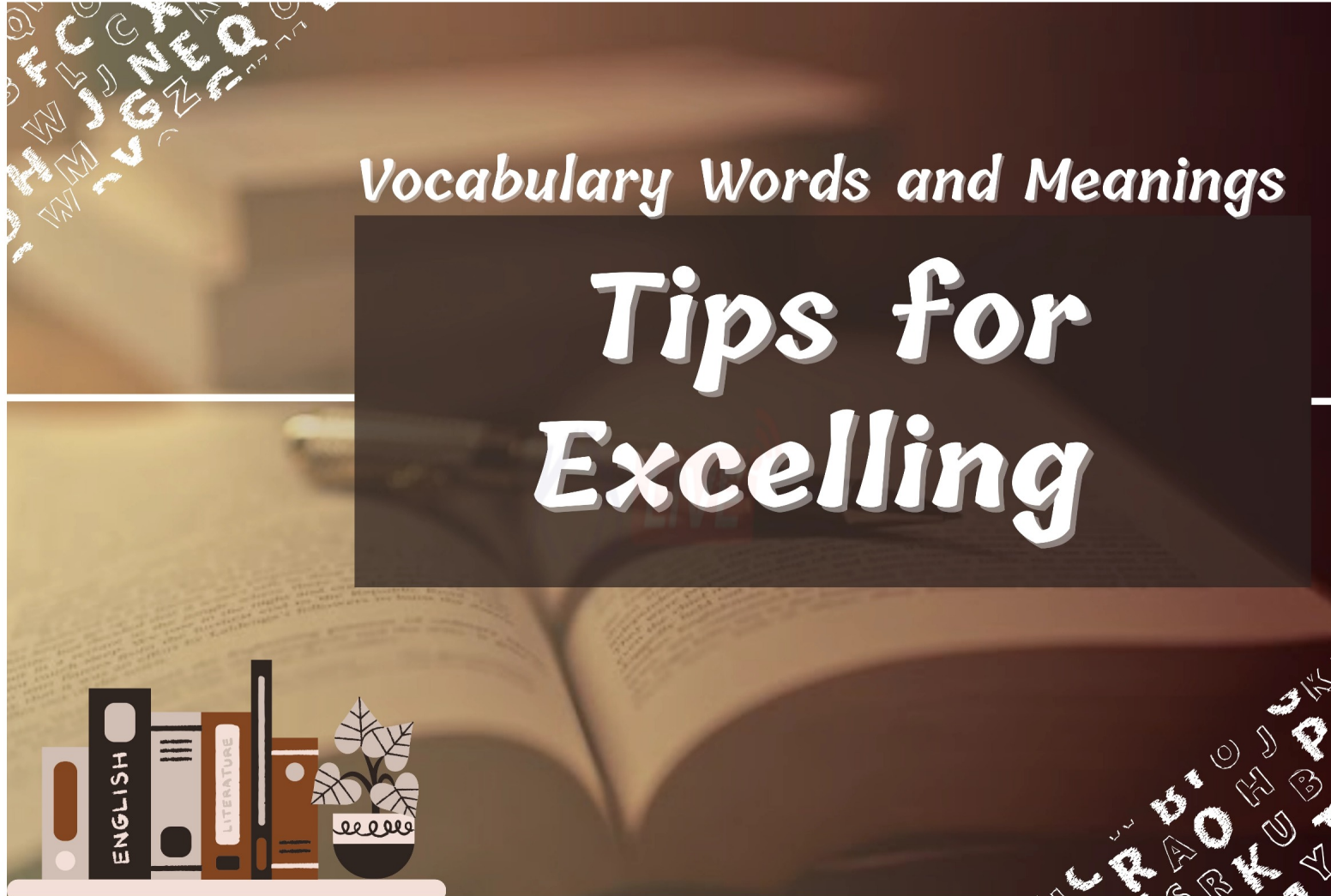

- **Abrogate (verb):** To repeal or abolish a law or agreement.

*Usage:* The government decided to abrogate the outdated tax law to simplify the system.

- **Bellicose (adjective):** Demonstrating a willingness to fight or be aggressive.

*Usage:* His bellicose behavior often led to conflicts with his peers.

- **Capitulate (verb):** To surrender or give in, often after a struggle.

*Usage:* After a long negotiation, the opposing sides finally decided to capitulate.

- **Deleterious (adjective):** Harmful or damaging to one's health or well-being.

*Usage:* Smoking has many deleterious effects on the lungs and overall health.

- **Enervate (verb):** To weaken or drain of energy.

*Usage:* The hot weather can enervate even the most energetic person.

- **Facetious (adjective):** Treating serious issues with inappropriate humor.

*Usage:* His facetious comments during the meeting were not appreciated.

- **Gourmand (noun):** A person who enjoys eating and appreciates good food.

*Usage:* The gourmand was excited to try the chef's new tasting menu.

- **Hapless (adjective):** Unfortunate or unlucky.

*Usage:* The hapless traveler lost his luggage during the connecting flight.

- **Iconoclast (noun):** A person who challenges or criticizes traditional beliefs and institutions.

*Usage:* The iconoclast author's writings questioned established social norms.

- **Juxtapose (verb):** To place two things side by side for comparison.

*Usage:* The artist decided to juxtapose light and dark colors to create contrast in the painting.

- **Kindle (verb):** To ignite or inspire a strong emotion or feeling.

*Usage:* Her passionate speech kindled a sense of unity among the listeners.

- **Languid (adjective):** Displaying a lack of energy or enthusiasm; slow and relaxed.

*Usage:* She spent a languid afternoon by the pool, soaking up the sun.

- **Mawkish (adjective):** Excessively sentimental or emotional in an insincere way.

*Usage:* The mawkish movie made the audience shed tears, but it felt contrived.

- **Nebulous (adjective):** Unclear, vague, or hazy.

*Usage:* The instructions for assembling the furniture were so nebulous that they were of no help.

- **Obfuscate (verb):** To make something unclear or difficult to understand.

*Usage:* The politician used complex language to obfuscate the real issue.

- **Pariah (noun):** A person who is an outcast or widely rejected by society.

- **Recalcitrant (adjective):** Stubbornly resistant to authority or control.

*Usage:* The recalcitrant employee refused to follow company policies.

- **Stalwart (adjective):** Loyal, dependable, and unwavering in support.

*Usage:* She was a stalwart friend who always stood by her side.

- **Truncate (verb):** To shorten or cut off a part of something.

*Usage:* The editor had to truncate the article to fit it into the magazine.

- **Ubiquitous (adjective):** Present, appearing, or found everywhere.

*Usage:* Mobile phones have become ubiquitous in modern society.

- **Vex (verb):** To make someone feel annoyed, frustrated, or worried.

*Usage:* The persistent noise from the construction site vexed the residents.

- **Winsome (adjective):** Attractive, charming, or engaging in a sweet and innocent way.

*Usage:* Her winsome smile won the hearts of everyone at the party.
