

- **Pernicious** (adjective) - Having a harmful effect, especially in a gradual or subtle way.

Usage: The pernicious habit of smoking can lead to severe health problems.

- **Querulous** (adjective) - Complaining in a whining manner.

Usage: The querulous customer found fault with every aspect of the meal.

- **Reticent** (adjective) - Not revealing one's thoughts or feelings readily.

Usage: She was reticent about discussing her personal life with others.

- **Sycophant** (noun) - A person who acts obsequiously toward someone important to gain advantage.

Usage: The sycophant constantly praised the boss to secure a promotion.

- **Tumultuous** (adjective) - Making a loud, confused noise; uproarious.

Usage: The tumultuous storm brought heavy rain and strong winds to the city.

- **Ubiquitous** (adjective) - Present, appearing, or found everywhere.

Usage: In modern society, smartphones have become ubiquitous.

- **Voracious** (adjective) - Wanting or devouring great quantities of food; having a very eager approach to an activity.

Usage: After the hike, she had a voracious appetite and ate an entire pizza.

- **Wane** (verb) - (of a state or quality) Decrease in power or extent; become weaker.

Usage: His enthusiasm for the project began to wane as it faced more challenges.
