







Usage in a sentence: Sarah's ardent love for painting led her to create masterpieces.


3. Benevolent (adjective): Kind and generous.

5. Pernicious (adjective): Having a harmful or destructive effect, often in a subtle or gradual way.






10. Zephyr (noun): A gentle, mild, or pleasant breeze.
