










Learn New Words in English - Enhance Your Vocabulary Pool

The Origin of New Words in English

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






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New words in the English language can originate from various sources and undergo a process of evolution.

- Globalization: Our connected world borrows words from different languages, giving us terms like "sushi," "yoga," and "tsunami."

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




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Why do New Words in English Matter?

 - *Usage:* "The incumbent president will run for re-election." OR "It is incumbent upon all citizens to vote in the upcoming election."
- **10. Libertarian:** A person who advocates for individual freedom and minimal government intervention in both social and economic matters.
 - *Usage:* "The libertarian candidate ran on a platform of reducing government regulation and promoting personal liberties."

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- 11. Microaggression: Subtle, often unintentional acts or comments that convey discrimination or prejudice.
 - Usage: "Addressing microaggressions is essential for creating a more inclusive workplace."
- 12. Overshare: To reveal too much personal information or details, often on social media.
 - Usage: "She had a tendency to overshare her personal life online."
- **13. Ubiquitous:** Something that is present or found everywhere.
 - Usage: "Smartphones have become ubiquitous in our daily lives."
- **14. Upcycle:** The practice of repurposing or transforming discarded or used items into something of higher value.
 - Usage: "She upcycled old pallets into stylish furniture for her home."
- 15. Veganism: A lifestyle and dietary choice that excludes all animal products, including meat, dairy, and eggs.
 - Usage: "Her commitment to veganism led her to explore new plant-based recipes."
