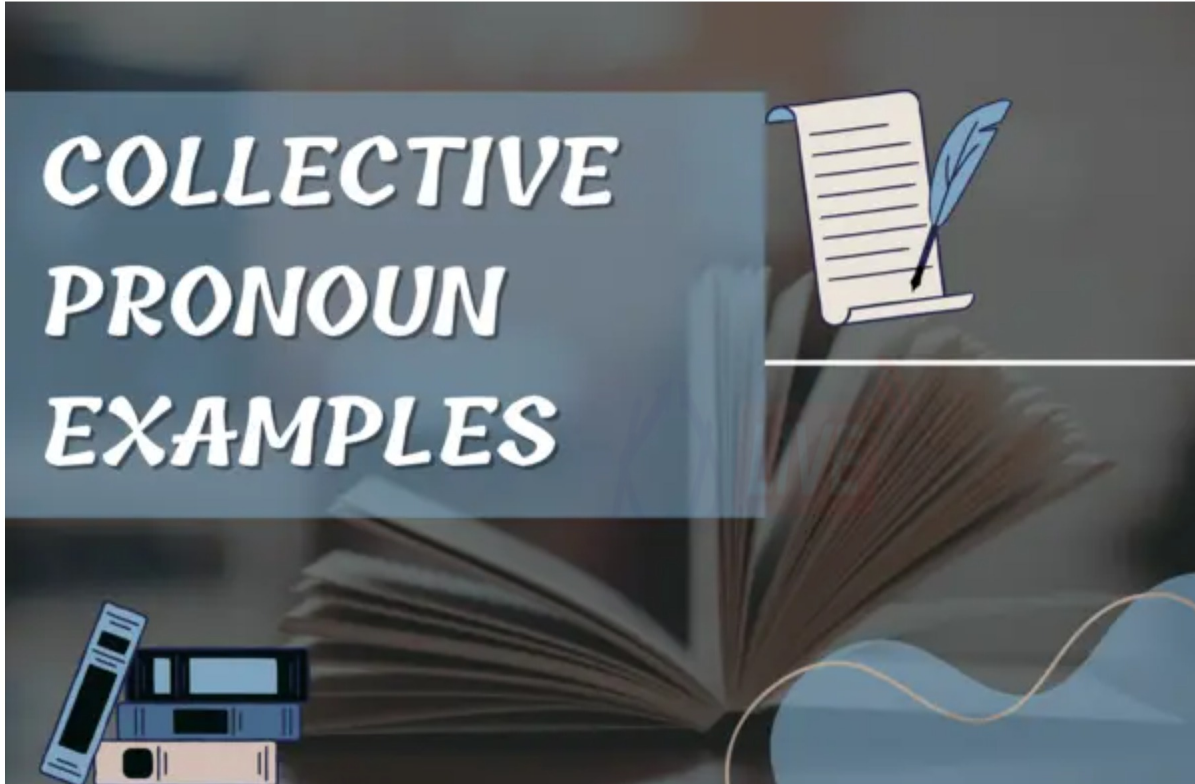


Collective Pronoun Examples

Instead of naming every single member of a group, you can use these pronouns to refer to the whole group at once. This makes sentences clearer and more straightforward. Collective pronouns are of different types, let us move forward to learn collective pronoun examples along with their types.

Collective Pronoun Examples

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To understand Collective Pronouns better, you must go through the vast list of Collective Pronoun examples given below. We have grouped these examples type wise and have also provided example sentences for each Collective pronoun. In this way, you will come to know about different collective pronouns of each type and the correct ways of using them in sentences.

Singular Collective Pronoun Examples

1. **Everyone:** Everyone is invited to the party, and I hope everyone enjoys themselves.
2. **Everybody:** Everybody in the office is participating in the team-building activity.
3. **Someone:** Someone needs to address the issue with the broken printer.
4. **Somebody:** Somebody left their umbrella in the office.
5. **Anyone:** Is anyone available to cover the morning shift tomorrow?
6. **Anybody:** If anybody has a suggestion, they are welcome to share it during the meeting.
7. **No one:** No one expected the meeting to last so long.
8. **Nobody:** Nobody wants to be left out, so make sure to include them in the team discussion.
9. **Each:** Each has their own unique perspective, and it's important to respect their individuality in the group.

In these sentences, "everybody," "everyone," "somebody," "someone," "anybody," "anyone," "nobody," "no one" and "each" are used as singular collective pronouns, referring to a group as a single entity.

Plural Collective Pronoun Examples

1. **They:** *They* are the team captains for the upcoming match.
2. **Them:** I saw John and Jane at the store, and I waved to *them* as they were leaving.
3. **We:** *We* are planning a weekend getaway to the mountains.
4. **Us:** The project's success is crucial for *us*.
5. **Others:** Some team members completed their tasks early, while others are still working on theirs.
6. **People:** *People* from different religions attended the cultural festival, showcasing the diversity of our neighbourhood.

Indefinite Collective Pronoun Examples



Collective Pronoun Examples

1. **Several:** Several participants in the workshop shared their experiences.
2. **All:** All employees are required to attend the safety training.
3. **Many:** Many shoppers took advantage of the weekend sale, and they saved a huge amount on their purchases.
4. **Few:** Few applicants met the criteria for the scholarship.
5. **Some:** Some of the employees have volunteered to stay late to complete the project.

NOTE: "Every" is not a collective pronoun. "Every" is an adjective that is used to indicate each individual member of a group. It is not a pronoun on its own; rather, it is typically followed by a singular noun. For example: Every student completed the assignment.

Collective pronouns represent groups without naming each member, making communication more efficient. Throughout this blog, we've learned about singular collective pronoun examples like "somebody," plural ones like "they," and indefinite collective pronoun examples such as "all" and "some."
