- **Verbs:** Verbs are the action words that convey what someone or something is doing. Examples are "run," "eat," "write," or "think."
- **Adjectives:** Adjectives tell us about the quality, size, colour, etc. They are the 'Describing Words' that describe or modify the nouns and pronouns. "Beautiful," "tall," "blue," or "funny," are adjectives.
- **Adverbs:** Adverbs are the words that modify verbs, adjectives, or other adverbs, improving our understanding of how, when, where, or to what context something happens. Examples include "quickly," "very," "here," and "sometimes."
- **Conjunctions:** Conjunctions can be understood as 'Connecting Words' that connect words, phrases, or clauses, allowing our sentences to coordinate. Common conjunctions include "and," "but," "or," "so," and "because."
- **Prepositions:** Prepositions establish relationships between words, answering questions like "where" or "when." Think of "in," "on," "under," "at," and "with" as answers, they are all prepositions.

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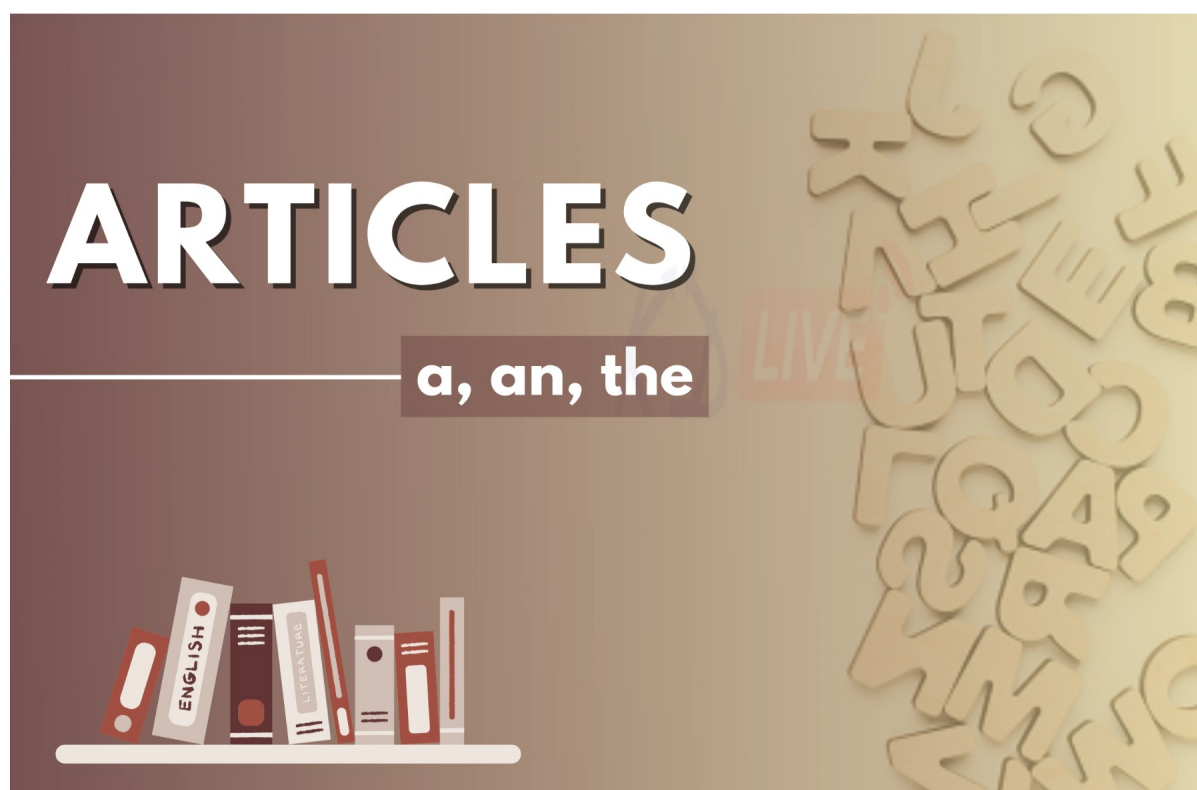

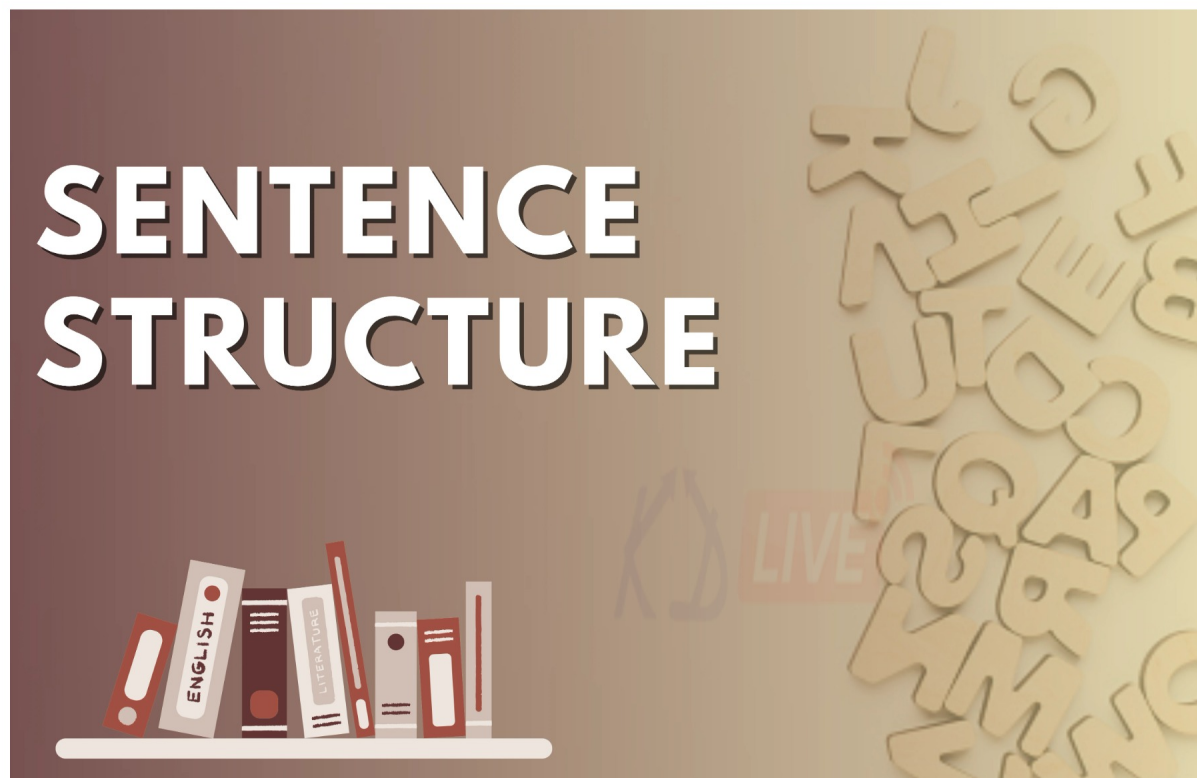

- **Definite Article:** "The" is the definite article. It's used when we refer to a particular noun or when the noun has been previously mentioned. "The cat is on the roof" points to a specific cat and roof.

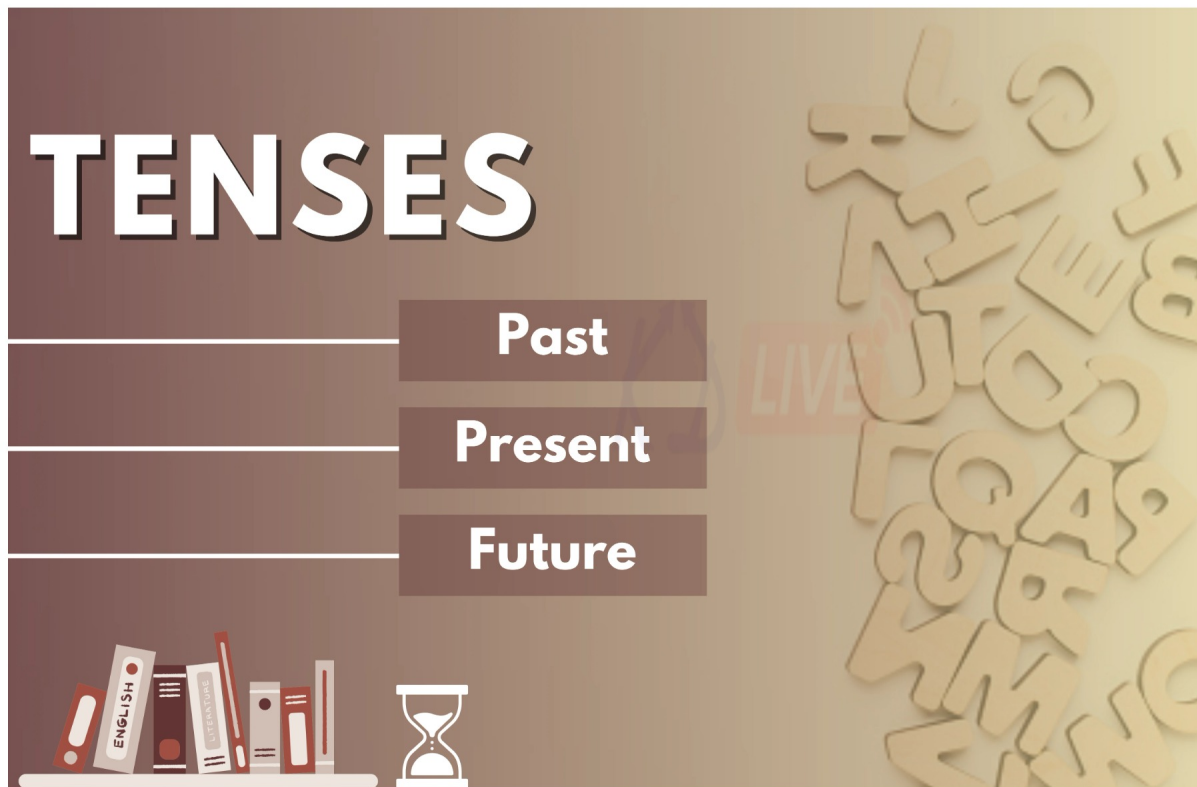

- **Simple Sentences:** A simple sentence contains a single independent clause, making it direct and easily comprehensible. For instance, "She reads books" is a simple sentence.
- **Compound Sentences:** Compound sentences have two independent clauses using a coordinating conjunction like "and," "but," or "or." Picture this: "He likes coffee, but she prefers tea."
- **Complex Sentences:** These sentences involve an independent clause and one or more dependent clauses. These clauses are united using subordinating conjunctions such as "although," "because," or "while." Imagine saying, "Although it rained, we went for a walk."
- **Compound-Complex Sentences:** Compound-complex sentences incorporate multiple independent clauses and one or more dependent clauses, combining the features of compound and complex sentences. Here's an example: "She studied hard because she wanted to pass, and she passed with flying colours."

# Tenses in English - Past, Present, Future

- **Passive Voice:** In cases when the subject is the recipient of the action, it's known as the passive voice. It shifts the focus to the receiver of the action, emphasizing the "what" rather than the "who." For instance, in the sentence, "A delicious meal was cooked by the chef," the emphasis is on the meal itself, not the chef. It adds depth, variety, and a touch of mystery to your communication.

## Speech in English: Direct and Indirect

The direct and indirect speech has a significant place in English Grammar Topics. Direct and indirect speech, also known as reported speech, are two ways to convey what someone else has said.
