Singular Possessive Pronouns Examples

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






Possessive Pronouns Examples

- · Mine:
- 1. The laptop is mine; please don't use it without asking.
- 2. This book is mine
- · Yours:
- 1. This pen is yours. I found it on the desk.
- 2. is this dog yours?
- · His:
- 1. The car parked outside is his; he just got it last week.
- 2. His dedication to the task is truly admirable.

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


Possessive Pronouns Examples

- · Hers:
- 1. The necklace she's wearing is hers.
- 2. She is a talented artist, the painting on the wall is hers.
- · Its:
- 1. The dog is wagging its tail happily.
- 2. The company is known for its commitment to environmental sustainability.
- · One's:
- 1. It's important to take care of one's well-being in stressful situations.
- 2. Achieving one's goals requires dedication and perseverance.
- · Their:
- 1. Each student should bring their backpack to class.
- 2. The team celebrated their victory with a parade.

Plural Possessive Pronouns Examples

Plural possessive pronouns are words that indicate ownership or possession of multiple items or people. They are used to replace nouns and show to whom or to what something belongs when referring to more than one entity. They replace longer phrases, making communication more efficient and concise.





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








Possessive Pronouns Examples

• Ours: The success of the project is ours; we worked hard as a team.

In this sentence, "ours" indicates that the success belongs collectively to a group.

Yours: These keys are not mine; they might be yours.

"Yours" is used to show ownership of items belonging to more than one person, with a specific focus on the person being addressed.


• Theirs: The house at the end of the street is theirs; they just moved in.

"Theirs" demonstrates ownership by a group or multiple individuals.

Possessive Pronouns Examples with Gerunds

Possessive pronouns can be used with gerunds to show association with an action, activity, or a state of being. Gerunds are verbs ending in "-ing" that function as nouns. When combining possessive pronouns with gerunds, it helps to indicate who is performing the action described by the gerund.

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








Possessive Pronouns Examples

• Mine: Watching movies is a favorite pastime of mine, especially on lazy Sunday afternoons.

In this sentence, "mine" shows ownership of the gerund "watching," indicating that watching movies is a personal favorite activity of the speaker.

• Ours: The team celebrated the victory by sharing a meal, making the success feel like ours.

Here, "ours" is used with the gerund "sharing," suggesting that the act of sharing the meal is connected to the collective success of the team.

In both examples, possessive pronouns help to clarify the connection between the owner and the action represented by the gerund.

Possessive Pronouns Examples: Usage in Sentences

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Possessive Pronouns Examples

- Ownership: The artwork on the wall is hers; she painted it herself.
- Relationships: We cherish our friendships, and ours has stood the test of time.
- · Avoiding Repetition: The red car is mine, and the blue one is hers.
- **Gerunds (Using Possessive Pronouns Before "-ing" Words):** She admired his singing, as it complemented hers during the duet.

Common Mistakes to Avoid:

· Confusing "Its" and "It's":

Example: The dog wagged its tail. (Correct) vs. The dog wagged it's tail. (Incorrect)

· Misuse of "Your" and "You're":

Example: Is this your book? (Correct) vs. Is this you're book? (Incorrect)

· Incorrect Use of "Their" and "There":

Example: The cat is over their. (Incorrect) vs. The cat is over there. (Correct)

"Their" is a possessive pronoun, while "there" indicates a location.

· Misusing "Who's" and "Whose":

Example: Whose going to the party? (Incorrect) vs. Who's going to the party? (Correct)

"Whose" is a possessive pronoun, while "who's" is a contraction of "who is" or "who has."


· Confusing "Our" and "Are":

Example: Our going to the concert tonight. (Incorrect) vs. We're going to the concert tonight. (Correct)

"Our" is a possessive pronoun, while "are" is a verb indicating action.
