Voice Meaning and Defination

According to grammar, the grammatical category of voice enables the reader to alternately interpret the action of a sentence without modifying the facts being given. An active construction and a passive construction are two alternative approaches to express the same notion. Let us now understand each of these voices individually, i.e., Active voice and Passive Voice.

Active Voice

Active voice is used to indicate the grammatical subject of the verb that is performing the action or causing the happening denoted by the verb. In an active voice, the focus of the sentence is on the subject. The beginning of the phrase reveals "who" or "what" is in charge of the activity when using the active voice. In other words, the verb's action is carried out by the subject. Active voice allows for the construction of stronger sentences than passive voice.











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Let us understand the usage of active voice:

- Active voice is used when the subject of the clause represents the agent of the main verb.
- Through active voice, one can effortlessly determine the subject of the sentence by asking the verb "who" or "what".
- In an active voice, the sentences are brief and simple to understand.

Let us take an example of a sentence in active voice:

My father has sent me a book on my birthday.

Here in the sentence, "My father" is a **subject**, "book" is an **object** and "sent" is the **verb**.

Passive Voice

When writing facts, the truth, or technical reports where the players are unimportant or unknown but the action taking place on the object is crucial, we use passive voice. In passive voice, the focus of the sentence should be on the object, that is, who or what is receiving the action and not on who or what is performing that particular action.

Let us now understand the usage of passive voice:

- Passive voice is used when the focus is to be laid on the action and not the actor.
- Passive voice is used when there is no need to know the actor performing the job.
- In passive voice, we use "by" as a prefix to know the actor or the subject of the sentence.

Let us take an example of a passive voice in correlation to the above-mentioned example of active voice for better understanding - A

book has been sent to me by my father on my birthday.

Rules for Transforming An Active Voice Into Passive Voice

- 1. To change the voice of a sentence interchanges the position of subject and object.
- 2. In transforming an active voice to passive voice, we keep the verb in the "Be + past participle" form of the verb.
- 3. There must be a transitive verb in the active voice.

Tenses Used in Active and Passive Voice **Simple Present Tense**

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Active: Base form or "-s/-es"

Example: Ram teaches English. She drives my car.

Passive: Is/am/are + past participle

Example: English is taught by Ram.My car is driven by her.

Present Progressive Tense Active: Is/am/are + verb -ing

Example:

• Radha is playing guitar.

• My brother is playing football.

• The students are learning Spanish.

• Someone is hiring him to work at McDonald's. Passive: Is/am/are + being + past participle

Example:

• Guitar is being played by Radha.

• Football is being played by my brother.

• Spanish is being learnt by the students.

• He is being hired to work at McDonald's.

Present Perfect Tense

Active: Has/have + past participle

Example:

• Some goons have robbed the Bank.

• She has finished the homework.

• He has not purchased all the materials.

• My country has achieved the SDG goals.











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Passive: Has/have + been + past participle

Example:

- The bank has been robbed by some goons.
- The homework has been finished by her.
- All the materials have not been purchased by him.
- The SDG goals have been achieved by our country.

Present Perfect Progressive Tense

Active: has/have + been + -ing

Passive: has/have + been + being + Past participle

Note: Because of awkward construction, the perfect progressive form is not used in the passivevoice.

Simple Past Tense

Active: Base form or -ed form

Example: She sang a song. A bike hit me on the road.

Passive: Was/were + past participle

Example: A song was sung by her.I was hit by a bike on the road.

Past Continuous Tense Active: Was/were + verb + ing

Example:

- he children were riding the bike in the field.
- The labourers were digging a well.

Passive: Was/were + being + past participle

Example:

- Bike was being ridden by the children in the field.
- A well was being dug by the labourers.











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Past Perfect Tense

Active: Had + past participle

Example:

• The slow cricket game had bored the spectators.

• My father had established good traditions in my family.

Passive: Had + been + past participle

Example:

• The spectators had been bored by the slow cricket game.

• Good traditions had been established by my father in my family.

Past Perfect Continuous Tense

Active: Had + been + -ing

Passive: Had + been + being + past participle

Note: Because of awkward construction, the perfect progressive form is not used in the passive

Simple Future Tense

Active: Will + base form of the verb

Example:

• I will read this document.

• She will not believe any stranger.

Passive: Will + be + past participle

Example:

• This document will be read by me.

• Any stranger will not be believed by her.

Future Perfect Tense











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Active: Will + have + past participle

Example:

- Ravi will have finished his homework.
- They will have taken all precautions.

Passive: Will + have + been + past participle

Example:

- His homework will have been finished by Ravi.
- All precautions will have been taken.

Note: Because of awkward construction, the future progressive and future perfect continuous form are not used in the passive

Voices of Sentences Assertive Sentence

Assertive sentences make a statement. They tell us something. They give us information, and they normally end with a full-stop/period.

Active: Subject + auxiliary verb + main verb + object.

- Radha has helped us many times.
- You have decorated the whole gallery.
- Nobody had listened to the problems of the bagger.

Passive: Subject + auxiliary verb + be + past participle + object.

- We have been helped many times by Radha.
- The whole gallery has been decorated by you.
- The problems of the bagger had not been listened to by anybody.

Interrogative Sentence

Interrogative sentences ask a question. They want information, and they always end with a question mark.











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Active: Auxiliary verb + subject + main verb + object.

- Are you practising Yoga?
- Has she started the new work?
- Were you reading a novel?

Passive: Auxiliary verb + subject + be + past participle + object.

- Is Yoga being practised by you?
- Has the new work been started by her?
- Was a novel being read by you?

Wh-family Interrogative Sentence

Active: Wh word + auxiliary verb + subject + main verb + object.

Passive: Wh-word + auxiliary verb + subject + be + past participle + object.

Imperative Sentence

Imperative sentences give a command. They tell us to do something, and they end with a fullstop/period (.) or exclamation mark/point (!).

(+).

Active: v1 + object

Passive: You are ordered + to + v1 + object

Command

Active: V1 + object

- Teach your students.
- Bring a glass of water.
- Open the window.
- Read the newspaper.

Passive: et + subject + be + past participle

• Let your students be taught.











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- Let a glass of water be brought.
- Let the window be opened.
- Let the newspaper be read.

Order

Active: V1 + object

- Drive the car fast.
- Do not walk outside.
- Listen to me.
- Do what I am saying.

Passive: You are ordered + to v1 + object.

- You are ordered to drive the car fast.
- You are ordered not to walk outside.
- You are ordered to listen to me.
- You are ordered to do what I am saying.

Request

Active: V1 + object

- Please help me.
- Please finish the work on time.
- Kindly pay attention.

Passive: You are requested + to v1 + object.

- You are requested to help me.
- You are requested to finish the work on time.
- You are requested to pay attention.

When "Please or kindly" is mentioned in the statement.











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Advice

Active: V1 + object

- Obey the rules.
- Don't smoke here.
- Help the poor.
- Respect your elders.

Passive: You are advised to + v1 + object.

- You are advised to obey the rules.
- You are advised not to smoke here.
- You are advised to help the poor.
- You are advised to respect your elders

Suggestion

Active: V1 + object

- Bless the kids.
- Take medicine regularly.

Passive: Subject (objective case) + should + be + v1.

- The kids should be blessed.
- Medicine should be taken regularly.



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Q:1 (1) To convert the given statement into its passive form, the following rules should be followed:

- Identify the subject, verb, and object of the given sentence.

In this case, the subject is "he," the verb is "has downloaded", and the object is "the movie".

- Move the object of the sentence to the beginning of the new sentence, and make it the new subject.

In this case, "the movie" becomes the subject of the new sentence.

- Add the auxiliary verb "be" in the same tense as the original verb.

In this case, since the original verb is in the present perfect tense, we will use "has been".

- Add the past participle of the original verb.

In this case, the past participle of "downloaded" is "downloaded".

- Add the preposition "by" followed by the doer of the action, if known.

In this case, the doer of the action is not specified, so we will omit this part of the passive sentence.

Q:2 (4) New copies of the album have been ordered by Shalu.

Q:3 (2) The given sentence is in past indefinite tense. It will follow the following rule: Active Voice: Subject + V2 + Object; Passive

Voice: Object + was/were + V3+ by + Subject

Q:4 (2) Structure of passive voice: Object + was/were + V2 + Subject; Structure of active voice: Subject + V2 + Object

Q:5 (1) Active voice: Subject + V1 + Object

Passive voice: Object + is/am/are + V3 + Subject.

Q:6 (4) Structure of active voice: Subject + V2 + Object

Structure of passive voice: Subject in objective case + V3 + Object in objective case.

Q:7 (3) Did they occupy the villa?

Q:8 (3) She will be told later by Manu.

Q:9 (3) The marble was rolled through a small plastic pipe by Robin.

Q:10 (2) The shop will deliver the clothes on Monday.
