National Flag Adoption Day, observed annually on July 22nd, commemorates the adoption of the Indian National Flag. This flag featured two horizontal stripes of red and green, representing Hindus and Muslims, respectively, with a charkha (spinning wheel) in the center, symbolizing self-reliance and the struggle for independence.

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### **Evolution of the Tiranga**

In 1931, a resolution was passed to adopt a tricolor flag as the national flag of India. The new design featured three horizontal stripes of saffron, white, and green, with the charkha in the center. Saffron represented courage and sacrifice, white stood for peace and truth, and green symbolized faith and chivalry.

However, to avoid religious associations and to ensure the flag represented all Indians, the final design was modified. The Constituent Assembly adopted the current version of the Indian National Flag on July 22, 1947. This version retained the tricolor scheme but replaced the charkha with the Ashoka Chakra, a 24-spoke wheel in navy blue, derived from the Lion Capital of Ashoka.




