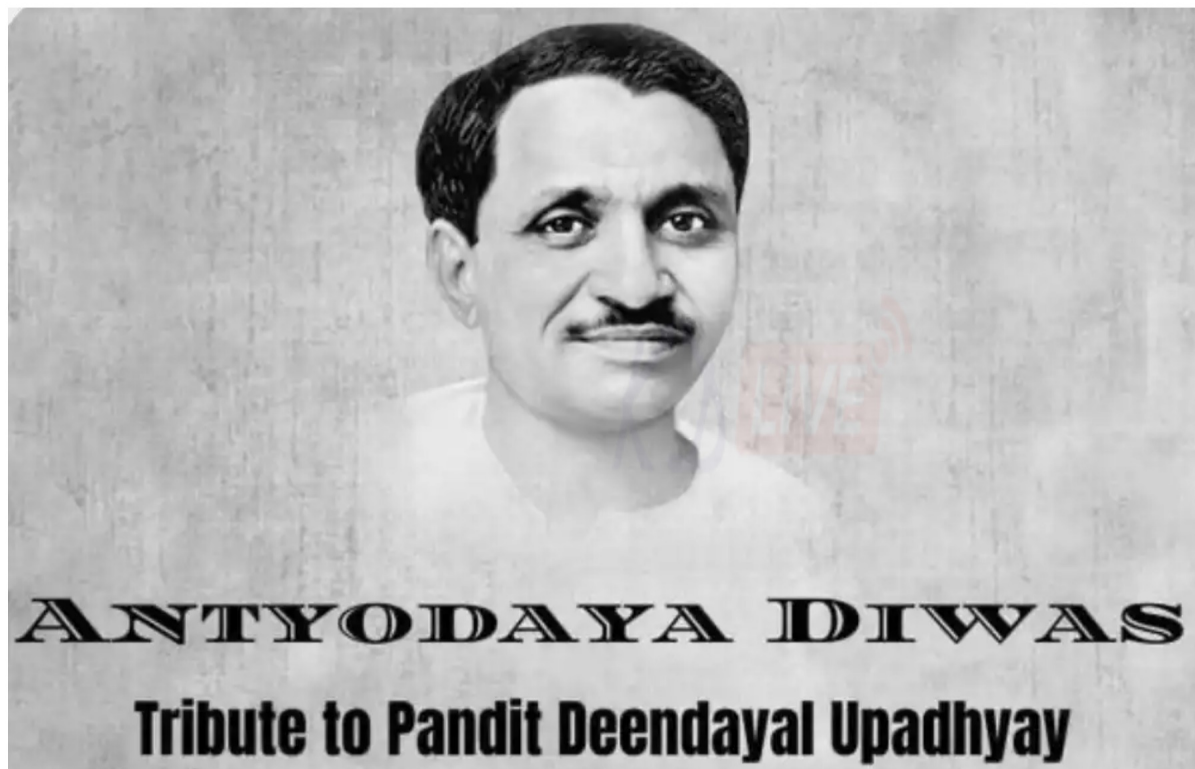
Celebrations and Activities on Antyodaya Diwas
