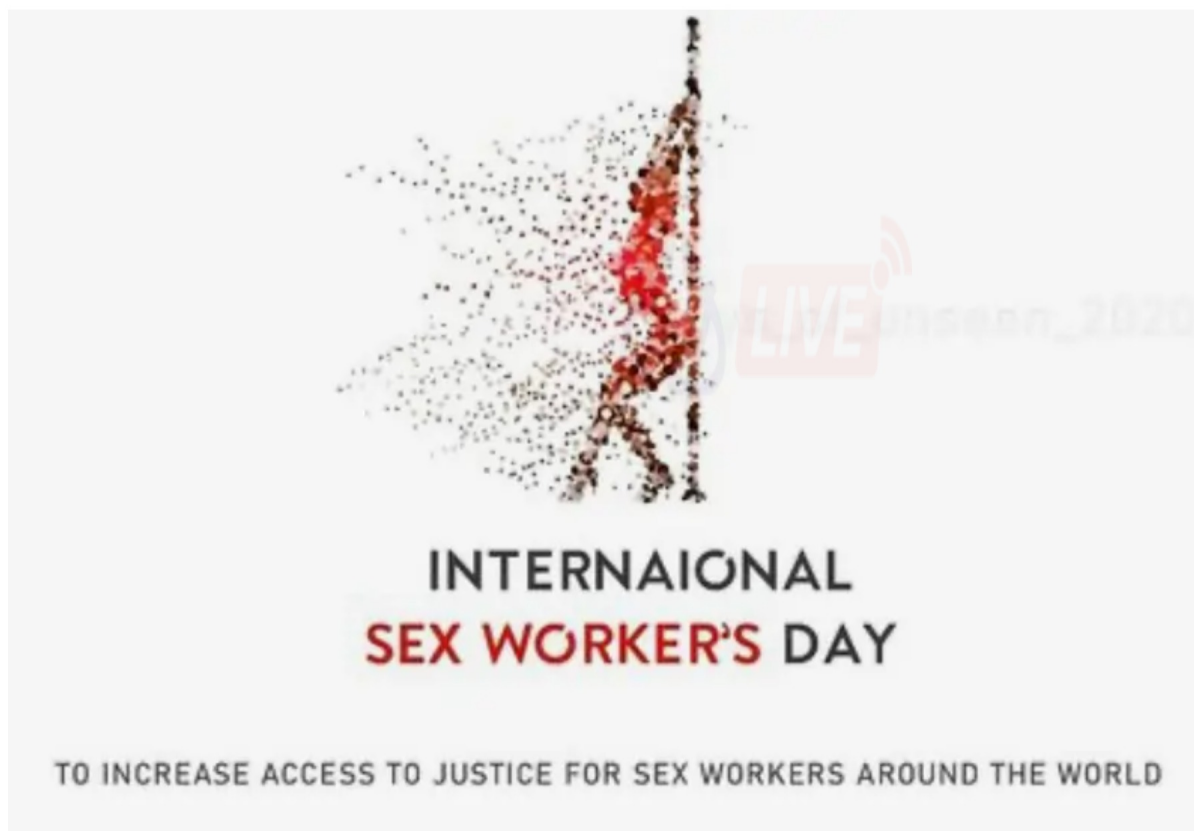


International Sex Workers Day: Advocating for Rights and Dignity - 2nd June

In response, sex workers decided to take collective action, occupying the church for eight days to demand an end to police brutality and the recognition of their rights as workers.

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The occupation of the Saint-Nizier Church marked a significant turning point in the history of the sex worker rights movement, galvanizing support for the rights and dignity of sex workers worldwide. Following the occupation, June 2nd was chosen as International Sex Workers Day to commemorate the protest and to advocate for the rights, health, and well-being of sex workers globally.
