

- 2. Sentence R goes on to talk specifically of the current time's limitations. As an addition of information this shall appear at next place.
- 3. Sentence Q adds more information to lay emphasis on the point made by the first statement, which is why it shall appear at third place. It also can be treated as a direct continuation to the previous statement.
- 4. Sentence S talks about the developing conditions of the speaker, that is about his lowering levels of confidence for the matter. This can be treated as a conclusive point to the narrative before the last/sixth line of the passage.

This arrangement follows a sequential manner where the various events, information, details get added without losing the context/meaning of the passage and fluency of narration.



• The usage of the word 'round' is inappropriate because the word implies itself as not just an adverb but also a verb, noun, adjective and preposition as well. Whereas the verb 'jam' requires only an adverb to complete it's meaning. Hence, the correct word would be 'around' that is an adverb.

• The tense portrayed in this part of the sentence becomes incorrect as it implies it's meaning in the past tense by using 'had been', whereas the tense implied in the former part of the sentence is in the present tense.
